### CLAIM OF OUTSTANDING TRICKS

The declarer or either defender may make a claim about winning the remaining un-played tricks.

It refers to tricks other than the one currently in progress. Most importantly the claim must include **clarification** of how the tricks will be won (see below).

**Claim:** A statement by declarer or a defender to the effect that a side will win a specific number of tricks is a claim of those tricks. A player also claims when he suggests that play be curtailed, or when he shows his cards (unless he demonstrably did not intend to claim)

**Clarification:** A claim should be accompanied at once by a clear statement of the line of play or defense through which the claimer proposes to win the tricks claimed, including the order in which the cards will be played. The player making the claim faces his hand.

Play is suspended after the claim.

Sometimes the claim is disputed and either the director is called or if agreed by all four players, play may continue, and the claim is cancelled.

When the director is called, they will request that the line of play to be restated. The director will decide the number of tricks won.

If there was no clarification given and/or no mention of outstanding trumps, then if by careless play tricks could be won by the opponents then the director will award these to the opposition.

This is a summary only, of Laws 68,69&70 from **The Laws of Duplicate Bridge 2017**.

# DIRECTOR IS CALLED

## Pass Out of Rotation

**Note:** Whenever there has been a call out of turn, the first option is for the Left Hand Opponent (LHO) to accept the call and the bidding continues in rotation.

### A. RHO'S Turn to Call

When a pass out of rotation is made at offender's RHO's turn to call, the offender must pass at his turn to call.

### B. Partner's or LHO's Turn to Call

When the offender has passed at his partner's turn to call, then

a) Offender's partner may make any legal call at his proper turn,

b) Offender may make any legal call at his correct turn and:

i) When the call is a "comparable" call there is no further rectification.

ii) When the call is not a "comparable" call offender's partner must pass when next it is his turn to call.

## Bid Out of Rotation

**Note:** Whenever there has been a bid out of turn, the first option is for the LHO to accept the call and the bidding continues in rotation.

### A. RHO's Turn to Call –

When the offender has called at his RHO's turn to call, then:

1) If that opponent passes, offender must repeat the call out of rotation

2) If that opponent makes a legal bid, double or redouble, offender may make any legal call:

i) When the call is a "comparable" call there is no further rectification.

ii) When the call is not a comparable call offender's partner must PASS when next it is his turn to call.

### B. Partner's or LHO's Turn to Call –

When the offender has bid at his partner's turn to call, or at his LHO's turn to call if the offender has not previously called, then:

1) Offender's partner may make any legal call at his proper turn,

2) Offender may make any legal call at his correct turn and the Director rules as in A2(i) or A2(ii) above.

## Chocky Rock Biscuits

250g margarine or butter      2 eggs  
1 cup castor sugar              2 cups S.R. Flour  
1/2 teasp. vanilla essence      4 cups corn flakes  
Half a packet choc bits  
Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy.  
Add eggs one at a time, beat well.  
Add vanilla and blend in the sifted flour and choc bits  
and half the corn flakes.  
Form into balls and roll in the corn flakes.  
Flatten a little with a fork and bake on a greased tray  
160 degrees for 15-20 mins. Cool on racks.

## BRIDGE HAND

Have you been guilty like we are of walking past our library at the club and not borrowing anything?

Two really good books we recommend are Patrick O'Connor's "A First Book of Bridge Problems" and his follow up one.

We have two books of each in our library. Each book covers 50 hands and it's a good book to pick up over a cup of coffee. I'm sure many of you will want to buy your own copies. It won best bridge book one year by the American Teachers' association.

Below is one of the 100 hands covered in the two books

### Problem 47 You are South, declarer in 4♥.

North ♠ KQ76 ♥ 986 ♦ AK53 ♣ 32

South ♠ J2 ♥ AKT53 ♦ J74 ♣ AT4

West	North	East	South
		pass	1♥
pass	1♠	pass	1 NT
pass	4♥	all pass	

You have a minimum hand balanced hand with five hearts so you open 1♥ and after partner responds 1♠ you bid 1 NT. Partner has an opening hand with three hearts and raises you to game.

West leads ♦ 10. What is your plan?

**Analysis:** You have one loser in ♠, one in ♦ and two in ♣ as well as one in ♥ and only if they behave. A ♣ loser can be ruffed in dummy so you need to eliminate one more. What is the best way to proceed?

### Solution 47

♠ KQ76  
♥ 986  
♦ AK53  
♣ 32

♠ A85  
♥ QJ4  
♦ T9  
♣ Q9865

♠ T943  
♥ 72  
♦ Q862  
♣ KJ7

♠ J2  
♥ AKT53  
♦ J74  
♣ AT4

You should knock out the ♠A and discard a diamond loser on the third round of spades. It is best to do this early because the opponents may lead another diamond when they get in.

Take the opening lead with the ♦A in dummy and lead a low spade to the ♠J in your hand. West will most likely win this with the ♠A and lead the ♦9, which you will take with the ♦K.

Now you can afford one round of trumps, so lead a small heart to the ♥A in your hand. Since you need to ruff a club in dummy later and you are going to have to lose the lead to achieve this, you cannot afford a second round of trumps. When the opponents get in they can lead a trump and you won't have one left in dummy to trump your club loser.

Next, lead the ♠2 to the ♠K in dummy and discard the ♦J on the ♠Q. That gets rid of your diamond loser. Now you can turn your attention to the club loser. Lead a small club from dummy to your ♣A and then duck a club. You can win any return and then ruff a club loser. You will end up with only three losers – a spade, a heart and a club.

**Key Point** Delay drawing trumps if necessary, in order to establish a winner in a side suit on which to discard a loser. Supplied by Richard Spelman
