

# Table Etiquette

## Please Do ✓

- Greet your opponents at the beginning of each round
- Offer positive encouragement to all players
- Avoid any remark or action that might cause embarrassment to any other player
- Thank your partner when they put down the dummy hand
- Thank your opponents at the end of each round

## Please Don't ✖

- Obviously count your tricks taken during play (do it in your head)
- Waste playing time – keep an eye on the clock and talk at the end of the round
- Argue with your partner about a board in the middle of a round
- Thank your opponents for giving you a trick you shouldn't have won

## Dummy's Role

As much as we want to help our partner, Dummy needs to be aware of what their role is, but also what it isn't.

Dummy is allowed to try and prevent any irregularity but once it occurs can no longer comment. This includes when declarer has either incorrectly led a card from their hand or named a card for dummy to play. Dummy should not tell partner they have led from the wrong hand and this is now treated as a lead out of turn. From Law 42 A.3 The Laws of Duplicate Bridge 2017 WBF

## Passing in a Board – how does it affect percentages?

Why is it that, when your table passes in a board, the NS and EW pairs at that table can end up with different percentages for that board?

The Board on the right, from a recent Thursday morning session, is an example. Everyone had less than 12 HCPs. Out of the nine tables that played this board, eight tables reached a contract and one table passed the board in.

For the table that passed that board in, NS got 62% and EW got 38%. Why is it so? If the board was passed in, shouldn't the EW and NS pairs get the same percentage as each other? Not so, and here's why.

When a board is passed in, the NS and EW pairs at the table get zero points for the board. However, for the board below, eight other tables played the board. Some NS pairs got a positive score and some got a negative score. Likewise, some EW pairs got a positive score and some got a negative score. The zero scores awarded to the NS and EW pairs that passed the board in (Table 3) is relative to the positive and negative scores of the other NS and EW pairs.

As you can see from the table below, the NS pair that passed the board in came 4<sup>th</sup> (three NS pairs scored higher) and the EW pair that passed in the board came 6<sup>th</sup> (five EW pairs scored higher). Hence the NS pair got a better percentage than the EW pair for the board.

On New Year's Eve, Ken finally lost his brave fight.

He and his wife, Di, played a huge part in getting our club built and running smoothly. The early days of fundraising were arduous and then came the actual build and landscaping with quite a few problems to overcome. Finally, Ken took on the role of president for many years, his motto being "Change what you can change, accept what you can't and have the wisdom to know the difference." Many harmonious years were spent under his stewardship.

Ken and Di married in 1964 and two children arrived, an enormous joy to them both. Ken saw himself as a handyman and an accomplished fisherman. He loved Swains Reef and for 40 years nothing would stop him joining his mates - until his heart played up at the end and he wasn't allowed to go.

When he retired, Ken took up bridge under Di's tutelage. His highlights included winning a plate in the State Bridge Championship and then representing the state.

Di decided the time was right to step down after over 20 years as a committee member. She forged her own role while constantly supporting Ken. She ran the bring and buy stall in the early days and the Kesters generously matched the money raised dollar for dollar. BBQs, Melbourne Cup, Xmas, club birthday celebrations - Di was always there. She looked after our masterpoints for years and club memberships. Thank you, Di, from all of us

Ken will always be remembered as a good, kind man who was easy going, calm and well loved. He had a huge contingent from our club at his funeral to show their respect. Ken and Di were awarded Honorary Life Memberships of our club. The club is a wonderful legacy from both of them.



# Beginners' Lessons Update

## Teacher's Corner – from Sue Holburt

The Club is abuzz on Saturday afternoons. Twenty-six people currently attend the Club's beginner lessons, with five returning to consolidate their knowledge. It is lovely to see them all so engaged and mixing so well with each other. My thanks again go to the seven members rostered to help at the lessons. They fill any incomplete tables and it makes my job a lot easier with seven tables of beginners asking questions.

Michele Thorne has recently offered to help with the teaching and I look forward to working with Michele for the next set of lessons, which start in July or August 2022.

In the past, John Moore presented Mini Lessons (20-30 mins) on a wide range of topics and I am keen to gauge the interest in this type of lessons. Please contact me or a committee member if you are interested.



## Post-Lessons Supervised Play

Supervised Play sessions, which run for approximately 6-8 weeks, follow on from the Beginner Lessons. These sessions allow players to practise their bidding and develop their card play. A short time is spent at the beginning of each session reinforcing features from the lesson or providing extra tips such as leads, finessing, etc. The sessions, which include members from past lessons, also allows players to gain confidence, find compatible partners, socialise and develop friendships within the club. Supervised play will be from 1:30pm to 4:00pm after the lessons finish and cost \$5 for members, \$7 for non-members.


## Lessons the Gateway to Monday Play

Naturally, the Beginner Lessons and Supervised Play are the perfect gateway to play, especially the Club's Monday sessions, where assistance with play is available and a partner is guaranteed. One beginner, who has started playing on Mondays, shared, "The lessons are great. I can follow Sue in class, but application at the table is the challenge! Every time you feel that you've got a handle on it, the next level of complexity gets introduced and you're back at the beginning again. But, once you've got the basics, it's practice and that means learning from your mistakes."

## Club Library

*Barbara's Bridge Tips* by Barbara Seagram is the newest addition to the Club's library.

In the preface, Barbara outlines six common errors to avoid in play – playing too fast, cashing tricks too early, drawing trumps too soon or too late, bidding errors, telling the same story twice, silly errors like not paying attention.



Barbara's writing style is conversational and she advises "As soon as a deal is over, you must erase it from your memory, especially if you did make a mistake. It is impossible to change the result, so get over it." Sometimes, easier said than done!

Not every book suits every person, so the library offers members the chance to have a browse and pick a book with a format that suits them. To borrow a book, fill out the card in front of the book and place the card in the 'Out' Box (in the library bookcase). When returning a book, retrieve the card from the 'Out' Box, add the return date and put the card back in the book. There is no cost to borrow the books.
