



# Difficult Hand

## Match 1 Board 5 from Teams Championship Saturday 15 October 2022

Four teams out of 12 found a 4H contract and one was in 5H. Two of those made 10 tricks. The other three only made 8 or 9 tricks. Eleven tricks can be made.

The main lesson from this board is hand evaluation. South has only 10 points but is very powerful if a fit is found - equivalent to a normal 18-19 point hand.

### Counting losers to evaluate the true strength of your hand

When I pick up my hand the 1st thing I do is to make sure I have 13 cards then count my losers. This gives a good indication of the strength of my hand if I find a fit with my partner.

With a normal opening hand of 12-14 points, you can expect 7 losers. A 1NT hand of 15-17 points usually has 6 losers. A hand with 18-19 points normally has 5 losers.

When opening, I normally require 12 points but will open with less if my hand satisfies the rule of 20.

In this hand the bidding is passed to South who only has 10 points but with a 6/5 shape satisfies that rule.

South's hand also has only 5 losers, so is very powerful - equivalent to 18-19 points if a fit is found.

### Bidding

North	East	South	West
pass	pass	1S	2D
X*	D	3H	4D
X**	pass	4H	

\* = negative double showing 4+ hearts  
\*\* = penalty double

Unfortunately, bidding did not go this way with us as my partner playing South passed and left the 4DX in for penalty.

The opposition made 8 tricks giving us 300.

However, with us vulnerable and the opposition not vulnerable, and having such a powerful hand with only 5 losers, it would have been better to play in 4H, which stood to give us a score of 620 if 10 tricks are made.

Also, at our table, West bid 2D whereas the Unusual 2NT would have found a better fit in clubs for E/W.

This is how our partners at the other table bid and found a good sacrifice in 5C.

### Play

Lead is AD, followed by a 2nd diamond which is trumped. Spade finesse to the QS then AS gives 2 spade tricks. A diamond is then trumped followed by a club which is won by West with the JC. From there on it is a simple matter of trumping spades in North's hand and clubs and diamonds in South's hand.

You will make 2 off suit tricks with the spades and 9 heart tricks by cross trumping, which = 11 tricks for 650.

We did get 6 IMPs for this board for the 300 less our partners' -50 for going 1 down in 5C, however, if we'd played in 4H we would have received a net 620 and 12 IMPs.

## Teacher's Corner

The beginners' lessons have just finished and my thanks go to the two Pams and Michele for continuing with running the Saturday 'help with play' sessions. This gives our brand new bridge players a chance to practise before joining the big league.

It is great to see lots of my past students playing on Monday mornings and on a lot of other days, too. The next lessons will start on January 28<sup>th</sup>, so please try to encourage your friends, neighbours, work colleagues and people from other clubs to have a go. We need new people to join our club every year to replace those who retire from bridge or move away and to help grow our membership.

### Delayed Game Raise of Partner's 1H or 1S Opening bid

You have a fit and 13+TP. Force partner to bid again by bidding a new suit. This allows partner to define their strength with their rebid. If partner is minimum, you can then jump directly to game. If partner is maximum, slam is a possibility. There is a one disadvantage - it does give the opponents more chance to compete in the auction. There are two useful conventions you can then use.

- **Jacoby 2NT** – shows 4-card support and 13+TP
- **Splinter Bid** – a double jump in a new suit, showing a singleton or void in that suit. It indicates 4-card support and slam interest.

The **Weak Freak** – 5 or more card support for the major, no more than 7 HCP and a singleton or void. You should bid directly to game. Partner will now know which type of hand you hold.
