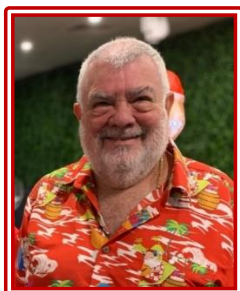

- Moore Trophy - commences Friday 10th February (continues on every second Friday of the month for 10 months).

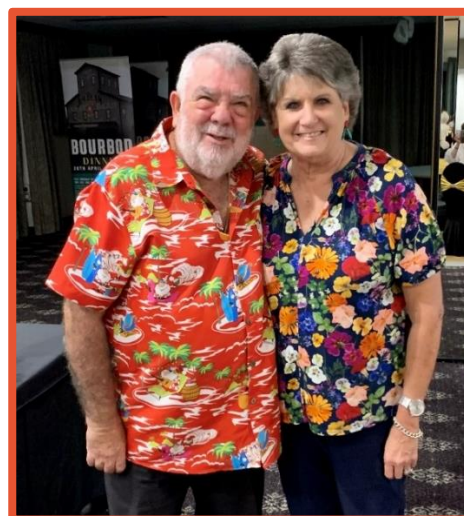
Club Calendar

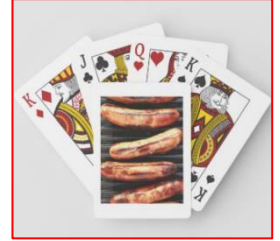


Social Sub-Committee News

South's double and rebid of hearts is a 'power' double, showing at least 16HCP and 5+ hearts. North, with 4 hearts in support, goes to game.

South has 3 certain losers - a spade, a diamond and at least 1 club, but only if the finesse of the A/Q clubs is onside.

The opening bid plus the penalty double by East indicates he has the KH and at least 3 hearts, so there will also be a heart loser unless you can finesse out his King.

You would like to finesse hearts and clubs through East, but only have 1 entry to North's hand in the KS.

It is obvious that you will need to find a way to get rid of a loser and your only hope is for a 3/3 break in clubs setting up the 4th club to discard a spade loser from dummy, which means you will need to give priority to the club finesse.

Lead is 4D to East's Ace followed by a 2nd diamond which you trump high with the 9H to avoid blocking the heart suit if you need to finesse later.

Since you must lose a club, you should immediately lead a low club which West will win and probably return a 3rd diamond for you to trump reducing your hearts to 3 - the A, J and 10.

Your plan was to make 3 club tricks and to discard a losing spade in dummy, so you can afford to lose 1 heart to go with your diamond and club losers.

You now lead hearts from your hand to try and force out the KH.

You lead the 10H which reveals the 4/0 break and East will probably hold up his KH. You follow with the JH which East also holds up leaving you with the AH, dummy with the Q, 8 and Declarer with the K, 6.

Cross to the KS and take your A/Q club finesse and then lead the AC with both following suit, making the remaining 6C a winner. Lead your AH, reducing dummy and East to 1 heart each. Then play your 6C winner tossing your losing spade.

East is forced to trump with his KH leaving you with the AS and QH to take the remaining 2 tricks.

You have lost only 3 tricks - 1 diamond, 1 club and the trick to the KH and made your contract.

Note: if you must lose a trick, it is almost always best to concede it early while you can retain control. This contract will only ever make if you concede a club on the 3rd trick.

If the opening lead is the QS instead of a diamond you should win with your Ace and if you again immediately concede a club trick you will make this contract.

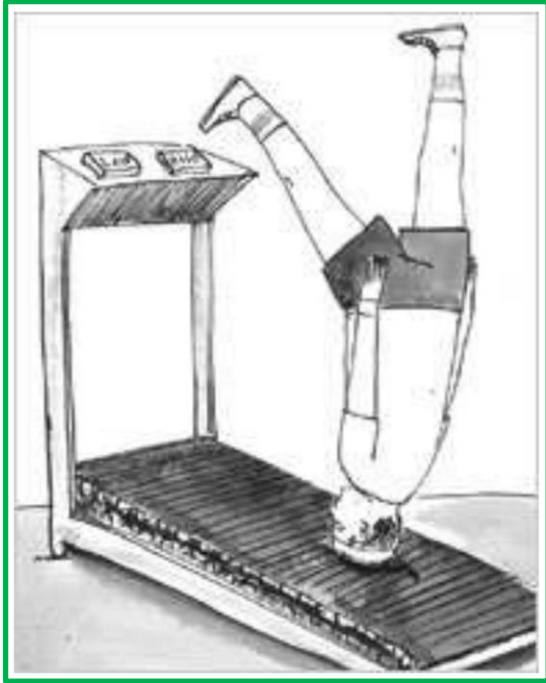

Teacher's Corner

JACOBY TRANSFERS (For newer players and those who don't play transfers)

This convention is used after partner has opened 1NT, 2NT or overcalled 1NT.

Responder makes an artificial bid that requests partner to bid the responder's long suit and does this by bidding the suit directly below it.

Why is it better to play transfers?

Most players say, "It is so that the player with the strong hand becomes declarer and does not have to put their hand down as dummy".

This is advantageous but, in my opinion, the greatest benefit is that responder can describe their hand more accurately and keep the bidding low if needed. A natural 2-level response to 1NT is a weak take-out and opener then passes. A 3-level response is usually game forcing.

Hand 1 ♠ KJ984 ♥ A63 ♦ 76 ♣ 952

Hand 2 ♠ KJ984 ♥ AK3 ♦ 76 ♣ 952

Hand 3 ♠ QJ8753 ♥ A63 ♦ J6 ♣ 95

All of the above hands are very similar. Game may be possible with all of them. Without using transfers, responder will be forced to bid 3S, as it is unknown whether there is a fit in spades. Hand 3 has a fit (i.e. opener must have at least 2 spades and responder has 6 spades) but is too weak to bid directly to 4S.

Hand 1 - After the transfer bid (i.e. responder bids 2H, opener re-bids 2S), responder then rebids 2NT. Shows exactly 5 spades and 8/9 HCP. Opener can pass without a fit and 15/16 HCP. The contract is still at the 2 level. NICE!

Hand 2 - Responder's second bid will be 3NT showing better points than Hand 1.

Hand 3 - Responder will transfer to spades then rebid the spade suit. This shows at least 6 spades and invitational values. Opener now chooses the final contract (either spades or NT) without having to guess.

It is so much easier for responder to describe their hand when using Jacoby Transfers.

Beginners' Lessons
