Greetings fellow Bridge lovers.






Difficult Hand

Teacher's Corner

Penalty Cards


There are two types of penalty cards.

Minor Penalty Cards - Accidentally dropping and exposing a single card (must be lower than ten) will result in a minor penalty card. The restrictions are few and this card only needs to be played first when choosing to play a non-honour card of that suit.

Discarding and trumping when unable to follow suit are legal plays.

Major Penalty Cards (MPC)- A card led out of turn, two or more cards exposed or an honour card accidentally exposed all result in a major penalty card. Declarer and dummy never have penalty cards. When the offender's partner is on lead, they must wait for lead directions/restrictions from the declarer. Failing to do this may result in their card also becoming a MPC.

Always call the director when any card has been incorrectly played or exposed.



The beginners' lessons finished early April and are being followed with supervised play run by the two Pams and Michele. Some of our novice members are also attending and benefitting from the mini lessons presented on the day. The next set of lessons commence on July 15th and flyers will be available next week.

Sorry, Partner.

Can't face that 5km on the treadmill, the overgrown veggie patch, that boring flight, the doctor's waiting room, the commute home? Here's something to help relieve your stress and transport you to the world of bridge.

Podcasts.

Think of a podcast as a radio chat show that you can listen to on demand. No need to tune into the wireless at a particular time. Podcasts are usually on a particular topic, like bridge.

Tere suggested a few bridge podcasts to me and Angela helped me to download a podcast app onto my mobile phone. My son blue toothed my phone to my car stereo so I can listen while I drive. You can also listen to podcasts via a computer. I subscribe to 'Sorry, Partner', a Podcast created by bridge champions Catherine Harris and Jocelyn Startz. It's free.

Catherine and Jocelyn do not tell listeners how to play bridge. They share emails from players about real-world experiences at the bridge table (often interpersonal encounters and usually funny) and interview bridge champions from all over the world. My favourite so far is with New Zealand champion, Pam Livingstone, a confessed 'nerd', who talks about neurodiversity in bridge and individual learning differences. The funniest story was about the dummy who fell asleep at the table. There are dozens of episodes and a new one is added each fortnight.

I think podcasts help keep story-telling alive. They help me feel normal (I often think, that happened at our table!!). The interviews are heart-warming and remind us that everyone was once a bridge novice.

Podcast topics are endless – politics, sport, travel, cars, learning a language or a musical instrument, crafts, bird watching, photography, dancing.......

Solution to Difficult Hand

(From page 2) Win the opening lead with the AC. Lead the AS and trump a 2nd spade, dropping the QS and KS from East's hand. Play the AH and trump a heart in dummy. Lead the JS - if East trumps low then overtrump. Trump another heart in dummy. Lead the 10S - if East trumps low again then overtrump. If East has trumped low on both occasions, then lead a diamond to dummy's Ace dropping East's King. Trumps have now been cleared and you can discard your JC on the 8S and claim 13 tricks.

If, at any time, East trumps high with the KD you can discard your JC. Then win the next trick, clear trumps and dummy's spades will provide discards for your losing hearts. You will make your 12 tricks losing only 1 trick to the KD.
